#### New Director for STAR

Sharing Telescopes and Resources (STAR) has a new director. Babak Sedehi, a member of the AWB Board of Trustees, has taken over management and development of this important program to share telescopes and other resources in the developed countries with those in less fortunate circumstances around the world (see www.astronomerswithoutborders.org/sta r for more about STAR). Babak was an important advocate of astronomy and outreach in his native Iran before taking positions in a variety of locations around the world. Now settled in Vancouver, BC, Canada working for Nokia Corporation, Babak understands the need for a program like STAR that makes telescopes and other resources so common in the developed countries available to those in developing countries as well. Babak's interest is in taking STAR beyond the current model of donating used or new telescopes to clubs in developing countries. He hopes that a self-sustaining business model involving integrated educational programs will eventually be developed.
